## **SELF-ASSESSMENT**For the Choral Conductor

OCDA and Ohio University will present a very unusual workshop for choral conductors on Saturday, October 22 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Attendees will study in depth how to measure their competency in rehearsal and assess their own values as a choral conductor. Clinicians will be Cornelia Yarbrough of Louisiana State Univ. and Peter Jarjisian of Ohio Univ. This intriguing self searching will take place at the School of Music, Ohio University Campus, Athens.

CORNELIA YARBROUGH is a Professor of Music and Coordinator of Music Education at Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge. She received the MME and PhD from Florida State University. Co-author of the book, Competency-Based Music Education, Dr. Yarbrough served for thirteen years as dual professor of music and education at Syracuse Univ., where she pioneered a program which demonstrated the benefits of behavioral self-assessment in the training of conductors.

PETER JARJISIAN is Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Ohio University, where he conducts the University Singers and Choral Union and teaches courses in conducting and choral pedagogy. He holds degrees from Susquehanna and Temple Universities and is completing the DMA in Choral Conducting under Robert Fountain at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Mr. Jarjisian performs professionally as chorister and Assistant Conductor of the Robert Page Singers.

#### ART SERIES IN CUYAHOGA FALLS

## **KNOX MUSIC SERIES**

This Outreach Program of Knox Presbyterian Church in Cincinnati will open its 1988-89 season on **Sunday**, **October 30**, **5:00 p.m.** with a performance of Gabriel Faure's *Requiem* by the Knox Adult Choir under the direction of Earl Rivers. This marks the 100th Anniversary of the *Requiem* which was first performed in Paris in 1888 at the Church of the Madeleine.

David Mulbury, who recently was a featured soloist in Houston before the National Convention of the American Guild of Organists, will accompany the piece. The concert, which is free, will be held at Knox Presbyterian Church, Michigan & Observatory Avenues, located in Hyde Park, Cincinnati.

Additional KNOX MUSIC SERIES concerts include a complete performance of Handel's *Messiah* with orchestra on December 18, an all-Rheinberger organ concert by Dr. Mulbury on March 17, and Beethoven's *Mass in C* on April 23.

STEVEN P. WIPFLI received his bachelors degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a Master of Music degee in


Coral Conducting and Music Education from Bowling Green State University. For the past three years, he has been the Director of Choral Activities at the University of Toledo where he conducted four choral ensembles and taught voice and courses in music education and choral conducting. He has returned to Ottawa Hills High School in Toledo to again work with junior and senior high school singers. Mr. Wipfli has guest conducted festival choirs in Wisconsin, New Hampshire, Virginia and Ohio. This past



summer he was a member of the Santa Fe Desert Chorale, a professional choral ensemble based in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

CRAIG S. ARNOLD is the director of choral activities and chairman of the vocal division in the Conservatory of Music at

Capital University in Columbus. Additional teaching responsibilities include course instruction in music education and conducting. A native of Minnesota, Arnold received a bachelors degree from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, a masters degree and work toward a doctorate at the University of Illinois in Champaign. He has served as clinician to school and church festivals throughout the midwest and Alaska and as educational consultant in training and development



for corporate clients. He remains active as a soloist, consultant, and clincian.

SANDRA FREY STEGMAN is an established musician, conductor and music educator. Her degrees culminate with a Master of Music degree in Choral Music Ed. with Conducting Emphasis from the U. of Michigan. She has taught music and directed choirs at the elementary secondary and college level. Sandra directs CANTARE, a well established choral ensemble from northwest Ohio and lower Michigan, and Junior Choral Society, a regional children's choir. Director of Music at Toledo's Hope Lutheran Church, she maintains a private voice studio and assists in operating MUSICAL RESOURCES. She serves as State Chairperson of Children's Choruses for OCDA as well as Central Division Chairperson for ACDA.

CAROL S. HUFFMAN has studied music both at the Conservatory of Music at Capital University and at the Hockshule fur Musik in Heidelberg, West Germany. She is presently a choral-vocal music specialist for the Pickerington Schools. Her choirs have received many awards and recognitions, performing for both the Ohio Music Educator's Convention and the American Choral Directors Association North Central Division Convention. Besides her extensive work with middle school choirs, Carol is quite active in church music as soloist, conductor, and musical director/producer. She is the State Chairperson of Middle/Junior High School Chorus, having just compiled an extensive list of quality and workable literature for the middle school and junior high chorus.

ROBERT A. MIX is the President of the Ohio Choral Directors Association. In his present position as Choral Music Director in the Lima City Schools, he conducts several choral ensembles at the Junior High Level. Bob is known nationally for his extensive knowledge of choral literature and has organized and done reading sessions at many conventions. His formal music training has been at Indiana U, a Bachelor's of Music Education and at Ohio State U. a Master's of Music Education. Bob is also very active as a church musician, conducting both youth and adult

choirs.

GARY E. STOLLAK received his PhD. from Rutgers-The State University of New Jersey and has taught in the psychology departments of Indiana University and, since 1966, Michigan State University. He has over 50 publications, and over 100 presentations at meetings of psychological societies and organizations, most of them focusing on the assessment, treatment, and prevention of child, marital, and family psychopathology. Articles relating to music have appeared in THE INSTRUMENTALIST and with his wife, Mary Alice Stollak, president of Michigan CDA, in THE CHORAL JOUR-NAL and in THE JOURNAL OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIA-TION OF TEACHERS OF SINGING. Both choral and band conferences have featured his interest sessions on teacher burnout, on stage fright, and on choir cohesion's effect on performance. He appeared at the 1986 Nation NATS Chicago Convention and the 1988 ACDA Central Division Convention in Cleveland.

#### **ABOUT DUES RAISE**

For years OCDA has maintained the same dues for members, but the "time has come" as the walrus said. Everything has increased--especially printing and publicity. OCDA will gain resources from a YES vote on Dues raise. It should have been done five years ago; now it is a vital necessity.

For every member OCDA will receive \$12.00 per member, plus \$3.00 per member set aside for a national state project fund. A state will receive \$18.00 for each brand new member joining OCDA/ACDA. This is needed at the state level to cover OCDA News increased printing and mailing costs, letters, phone calls, all things that cost money in maintaining a state organization.

As long as I can remember OCDA officers have paid some bills "out of pocket". We also need a cushion for conferences, which membership does not support with enough attendance, to pay for expenses. (Insertion: Dick and Terry came out with a very few dollars to the good with the Summer Convention. Hurrah for them! Every conference is a worry because our estimation of attendance may be way off.)

At the national level monies are greatly needed for a WATS line, for added personnel, and for salary increases which have been forced to stay at a ridiculously low level because the money simply was not there...In other words it is time we support financially **what we believe in. VOTE YES** for a dues raise.

#### B.W. DEDICATION October 14

The sparkling new lobby of the Kulas Musical Arts Building at the Baldwin-Wallace College Conservatory of Music will be dedicated Oct. 14 in honor of Martha Goldsworthy Arnold of Midland, Mich., a long-time B-W trustee and benefactor.

The area outside of the College's primary concert hall, Gamble Auditorium, will be dedicated at 7:30 p.m., prior to an 8 p.m. concert by the Baldwin-Wallace Symphony Orchestra, Dwight Oltman conducting.

The area, which will be known as the Martha Goldsworthy Arnold Lobby, was expanded significantly by the removal of three practice rooms and a faculty mail room. Exterior and interior stairways were completely redesigned.

A 1930 graduate of the B-W Conservatory of Music, Martha Arnold has been a member of the B-W Board of Trustees since 1974. She holds an honorary Doctor of Fine Arts degree from her alma mater as well as an honorary degree from Saginaw Valley State College.

"We at Baldwin-Wallace College are delighted to be able to honor Martha Arnold for her long and dedicated service to this College and its conservatory, for her commitment to music and her support of higher education," said Neal Malicky, B-W president.

#### Ohio Honors Chorale Concert Europe 10th Anniversary Year Tour Information

What is this group? What is its purpose? What does it do? It is a Concert Choir of Ohio High School students who have been selected for membership in this touring choir through private, individual audition. Its purpose is to introduce its members, through a fine concert tour, to some of Europe's historical centers, people, and cultures; to aid in the growth of better appreciation, understanding, and love of our fellow-man. Through our concerts, home-stays, and other personal contacts with our concert audiences, we believe that we come closer to mutual understandings that will benefit us all.

Is the Chorale a sponsored group? What are the costs?
The Ohio Honors Chorale is a non-sponsored, non-profit activity!
Each member is personally responsible for his or her costs as listed in the General Information bulletin available from your source of this application form, or by writing to the director of the Chorale as shown overleaf. The 1988 tour-cost was \$1915.00 for all transportation, lodging, and two meals daily.

Who may apply for membership?
Any bona fide high school student, a member of their vocal music program, who receives the recommendation of the Choral Director, and of the school Principal. Because of the demands of the tour, preference is given to current members of the 10th, 11th and 12th grades. Total membership is limited to a maximum of 48 singers.

What are "auditions"? Where are they held? When?
The applicants sing before a panel of O.H.C. staff-members, a solo of their choice, then are tested for sight-reading, and general musicianship skills, and are evaluated for personality. Auditions are held at Grove City, Ohio high school on the applicant's choice of the dates listed. See otherside for details.

Who are the directors of the Chorale?
All staff-members are present, or former, Ohio H. S. Choral Directors, who are members of the Ohio Choral Directors Association, and of the Music Educators National Conference, selected in recognition of their very successful teaching careers. Staff members are listed on the General Information sheets.

Where will this year's tour go? What are the dates?
Tour dates are expected to be June 28th - July 18, 1989 for this year's 21 day tour. It will be preceded by a one week rehearsal camp at Kenyon College, Gambier, Ohio. Dates and itinerary have not been confirmed. The route is expected to include parts of The Netherlands, Belgium, Western Germany, and Switzerland. Details and information brochures will be forwarded to all applicants.

Will your school be represented this year?

## OCDA N.E. REGION **Inspiring Example** or a Challenge to **OCDA** Region Chairs

Thirty-three choral directors and forty-one high school students participated in a Choral Conference sponsored by the Northeast Region of OCDA on Saturday, September 24. The event was planned by a committee consisting of Roger Clary, John Drotleff, Herb Henke (Chairman), Tom Hite, and David Powers. Educator's Music provided music for the reading session and Lakewood Methodist Church provided the location--both generously contributed without charge.

The theme of the Conference might be summarized as "meeting the needs of the less-than-perfect choral ensemble." C.M. Shearer began the day by working with the high school students alone to demonstrate techniques of teaching choral musicianship. He used Viadana's "Sing, Ye Righteous" (Concordia) as he put the un-auditioned, randomly-convened ensemble through their paces. The students' response, both

musical and attitudinal, was excellent.

Eight choral directors from area high schools and churches led a reading session. Each of the directors presented two or three compositions (supplied by Educator's Music) that he or she had found to be excellent for working with inexperienced singers. The directors were: Frank Bianchi, Lisa Hanson, Paul McGahie, Jessie Reeder, Eric Richardson, Mike Seredick, Ted Williams, and Bill Zurkey.

Following lunch a panel of teachers and students presented "Ideas for Your Choral Program" to share their experiences with leadership organization, fund-raising, social activities, and teaching techniques. This session was chaired by Roger Clary with assistance from Marjorie Cramer and Lou DiRienzo.

The Conference closed with a Masterwork Sing under the direction of Frank Jacobs, Carol Longsworth, and Edward Maclary. Their selections included works by Beethoven, Banchieri, Palestrina, and Handel.

The day was an unqualified success. Both directors and students found the music and discussion stimulating. And it was a great experience for the directors and students to sing together as one choral ensemble.
